Hegemony was a term previously used by Russian Marxists such as Vladimir Lenin to denote the political leadership of the working-class in a democratic revolution. Gramsci greatly expanded this concept, developing an acute analysis of how the ruling capitalist class – the bourgeoisie – establishes and maintains its control.

The Italian Marxist Antonio Gramsci developed the key concept of cultural hegemony during his imprisonment by the Italian state under Mussolini's

fascist rule. In his Prison Notebooks (w. 1929-1935), he posited how dominant class ideology took shape and exerted its influence through the manufacture of consent. Gramsci based his ideas of hegemony on the Marxist theoretical concepts of Base and Superstructure.
